

Minutes of the June Church Council Meeting

Call to Order: Moderator Dave convened the meeting at 6:30 PM. **Devotions:** Portia read an extract of correspondence from her daughter Stacey, "When we get through this", about the Covid experience and expected return to life's norms: sitting around a huge table, telling stories, hugging, being with friends and family, grateful for the little things, seeing time as gifted, knowing what we need.

Minutes of previous Meeting: Dave brought to attention the previous (May 3rd, 2021) Council Meeting Minutes which referenced, in item 4 of "Old Business". the seconding of a motion by Darrell. Not being a Council member Darrell is unauthorized to second a motion. Consequently, the motion officially could not be carried, the approval in error. The motion was to accept itemized conditions for reopening the church. To recap: 3 foot spacing between individuals, an allowance of 55 parishioners for seating in the sanctuary, alternate pews employed, Dave, Richard and Ron to be greeters, two entrances used with masks and hand sanitizer available at each entrance, along with programs and offering plates, singing with masks on, speakers free to not use masks, air flow designed by Holly, fellowship to be conducted out of doors, refraining from handshakes and hugs, no shared food, a request that those feeling ill not attend the service, visitor POC's established in case of determined Covid exposure, space for additional attendees to be provided in the lounge, Betty to continue to provide music through the summer. To address the erroneous approval of the above-described motion. Holly made the motion to accept conditions for reopening the church as previously described at the 3 May 2021 Council Meeting. Marilyn seconded Holly's motion; the motion passed unanimously.

Benevolence: Marilyn reported a balance of \$215.78, no change in the last month. **Pastor's Report:** Claudine was not feeling well and was unable to attend. Sue, from an email sent by Claudine, stated Claudine would be on vacation June21st to 30th. The Rev. Grubbs will preach at the service on June 27th. Worship guidelines have been updated to allow masks being optional for those fully vaccinated. For those not vaccinated it is requested that they continue to wear them. Other Covid restrictions remain in place with fellowship to be conducted outside, no food provided, though consideration of restrictions being lifted in September continue. Heidi's registry and licensing journey continues.

Ministry and Committee Reports

Pastoral Relations: Sue had nothing to report. Hospitality: Cathy and Sarah had nothing to report.

Nominating: Richard had nothing to report.

Finance & Stewardship: Patti reported the three accounts continue without change. Education and Discipleship: Carol reported there would be a meeting "tomorrow".

Mission & Outreach: Holly and Diane had nothing to report.

Buildings & Grounds: Rick reported he went to Express Kitchens to get options for renovat-

ing the kitchen in the rental property.

Rick discussed the images. Of importance was the placement of the refrigerator, 32 inches wide, in the allotted space, 36 inches wide. Because of the radiator placement the refrigerator door will not fully open. Getting to the cabinet above the refrigerator would not be easy. Pros and cons of refrigerator location were regarded. Adequate access to inside the refrigerator was established. Richard made a motion to accept the plans as distributed, Sue seconded the motion. Further discussion of the plans followed. An island was thought to be too impractical for the space available. Richard stated the quoted price of the cabinetry was \$4,870.22, though minus tax, and with a \$200 allotment from Express Kitchens for a church project, the actual price would be \$4,329.43. Estimated cost of installation was \$1,400.00.

Rick pointed out possible further monetary savings from energy conservation programs and noted free estimates are available for insulation costs. Groton Utilities may offer discounts, Drew said he would investigate what is available and see what the qualifications are. Richard said insulation of the house might be expensive by virtue of its construction, the only insulation currently in the house at the top of the stairs in the storage spaces. Discussion of insulation progressed. It was affirmed there are no requirements for insulation, further assessment for such needs of the property can be later regarded. At a savings it was stated the stove is donated and would fit in the prescribed location. There is no exhaust fan above the stove. Richard said the designated cabinetry is of good quality, all wood, birch, light, there is no particleboard, drawers dovetailed with automatic closure, base cabinets containing drawers. Dave asked for a vote on Richards's previous motion to accept the plan distributed to the Council members, which vote was unanimous in approval.

Budgeting for the renovations was discussed. As there is a line item which covers current expenses it was requested that purchases to remediate the rental property have it noted on the receipts that the purchase are for the rental property. However, the lineitem amount is projected as being spent. Use of money from the Memorial Fund and the General Fund for the rental property renovation were widely discussed. It was noted that up to half the money in the Memorial Fund can be employed for church purposes, in this instance for renovation of the rental property, without approval from the congregation with the stipulation it be paid back in a six-month timeframe. Additionally, the returned security deposit for the property, put in the General Fund, may also be used. Costs for the renovation have yet to be established. To determine anticipated costs Richard said he would generate a checklist of needed projects. Donations and fundraisers may help cover expenses. Rick noted permits will be required for plumbing and electrical work, which permits would require a plan with expected cost. Previously in the discussion Richard made a motion to use half the money in the Memorial Fund to pay for the property renovation, seconded by Cathy, which motion was at the end of discussion unanimously approved.

New Business: Belle asked the Council to grant permission for a tag sale the 19th of June. Patti said she would like to incorporate a bake sale on the same date. Holly made a motion to have a tag/bake sale on June 19th with proceeds to be for the rental property renovation. Rick seconded the motion, unanimously approved. While previously permission for tag/bake sales was not under the purview of the Council it was noted that we are still under Covid restrictions which deems such approvals warranted.

Dave noted Candy Zeppieri was given permission to use the Purple Room, June 26th, for a bridal shower, after Council approval via email vote.

AA has asked to restart their meetings at PBBC as they had previously, prior to the Covid pandemic. Marilyn made a motion, seconded by Li Ling, to have AA's return be held off until September. Discussion followed: salient concerns were that up to 40 people might attend, significantly more than estimated to be at non-church gatherings otherwise permitted; AA was not always attentive to effective clean up after their meetings; would holding off an immediate return incline AA not to return come September. The motion to hold off return of AA meetings on church property was upheld by a vote of 6 for, 3 opposed, with 2 abstentions.

Dave noted the Council historically has often not held meetings on the Monday after the first Sunday in July, though meetings have been called for after Sunday service on an as needed basis. Holly made a motion to suspend the Council meeting which would have met in July and to deal with any Council issues that arise via email, or to set up a meeting at everyone's convenience. Marilyn seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.
