



Poquonnock Bridge Baptist Church Council Meeting Minutes October 1, 2018

Our moderator, Catherine Hiller, opened the meeting at 6:30 p.m. and Marilyn Benson led us in devotions.

Heidi summarized the old and new business from last month. Minutes were accepted and filed.

Communications: nothing to report

Benevolence: Marilyn Baird

• Marilyn reported that the balance is \$611.77.

Pastor's Report: : Claudine Crooks

- This Sunday is World Communion Sunday. We will hear scripture in 6 languages, have Portuguese bread and Burmese grape juice for communion, and we will sing "Break Thou the Bread of Life" in Chin.
- This Thursday at 5:30 p.m. is our potluck supper & program with American Baptist missionary Mercedes Gonzales-Barnes. She wanted to come to our church because we're one of the churches with highest giving to her ministry specifically, and she wanted to come and say thank you and tell us about her ministry. Marilyn Benson is helping to coordinate. We have invited other SUNL churches, and have heard back from Union Baptist that they will have people coming.
- During October we will be taking our World Mission Offering, and will receive
 gifts for all the missionaries in the denomination. There is a new guide upstairs
 that lists every American Baptist missionary by name, and gives stories about
 their service, etc. Carol Gatlin will most likely speak more in detail about this
 offering during a moment for mission on one of the last two Sundays in October.
- The CROP Walk is October 14th.
- Last Sunday, we voted in new members, and we will extend the right hand of fellowship on Sunday, October 14th. There will be a cake to welcome the new members and their names will be printed alongside it.
- Apologies for last month's confusion with new retreat leading cost:
- ♦ This is Rev Ho-Soon's last year in the community, she will be reassigned soon and she has great gifts for leadership. Other years Claudine has done the leadership and guests have come in for small parts. Claudine has compensated them herself to thank them for helping her lead, but she's doing something different so that someone else can lead this year.
- ♦ Pushing for more attendees to get costs down
- The Apple Festival will be October 13th, but Claudine won't be able to be there for the morning due to the memorial service for Jim Henschel, Elaine's son, at Eastern Point Beach. Claudine will give out more information next Sunday about whether the service is public or is just a family gathering.
- All Saints' Day is the first Sunday of November; Claudine will be taking vacation time and will be away. Rev. Tim Chesser will be there. Claudine has talked to Catherine about doing the list of names for remembrance, Holly will do the bell, and we will need a candle lighter. Claudine will make sure that Mei Ling will have a check for Rev. Chesser. Hopefully the Worship and Membership team can review with him that morning how it will go.
- Holly and Claudine attended a youth ministry meeting recently we have a small number of youth involved at the moment. Courtney is hoping to make some council meetings to meet PBBC members. Holly has gone through safe church training to be a youth group leader, and Heidi will hopefully do so soon as well.

- Gayle Donahue is at a critical point in decision-making; she is still at the Regency but has had to make decision to leave the Mystic River Congregate. She has to be out by October 31st. Belle is ready to put together a packing & moving team when the time comes.
- The last piece of Claudine's report was a conversation about church safety due to recent visits from individuals under the influence of drugs or alcohol who might pose a threat. There's no way to predict what we might encounter in the future, but Claudine had the following comments:
- ♦ If you're ever here in the church building alone, lock door
- ♦ You are under NO obligation to open/answer the door. Although that is hard, because our instinct is to be kind and welcoming, you have every right to not answer or to not let it be known that you're here. Be prepared to call 911 if need be. If you have to have a conversation with an individual that shows up at church unannounced, make sure that someone else is around and present with you.
- We'll have some follow-up conversations about this in the coming days, and Claudine will be following up with Dave to make it a part of the Safe Church Committee's ongoing work.

Buildings and Grounds: Alex Lew and Brian Berry

- Alex spoke with Mei Ling yesterday about getting the Miner building project moving forward. Council members worked out who needs to be contacted to arrange the logistics of paying the 50% project deposit so that work can begin as soon as possible.
- The washing machine in the parsonage had to be replaced when it ceased functioning. Richard Tourjee had a professional look at it, but it was too far gone to have a worthwhile repair done. Catherine approved Richard to go purchase one, because it needed to be purchased as soon as possible.
- Road signs have been installed, thanks to John Rodearmel for taking on the project
 of rehabilitating OMBC's old signs. Is there any value in asking him to look at our
 old signs that are in the closet to see if they can be reused? Alex/Brian will look at
 them before the work day and either have John fix them or throw them away.
- Fall Work Day the plan is for Saturday, October 20th, with a rain date of October 27th. About 9-12. Alex walked around the parsonage with Jon Hiller yesterday, and they worked on putting together a work list, including: parsonage gutters, hedge trimming, fence section that is out from tree cutting, lots of bittersweet on the fence, vents on roof ends of parsonage attic, other things on outside, paint on front church door is peeling, kitchen vent is rusty by door, brush around parking lot and fence, balcony items to be moved to dump or placed elsewhere (spoke to Belle), window tabs in fellowship hall are rotted, vestry floor needs cleaning because of scuffs and broken pieces
- Ron went to replace bulb on front sign, bulbs are the wrong size, so Ron will look into it this week to get them as cheaply as possible

Mission and Outreach: Carol Gatlin and Holly Boyle

- Catherine talked with Carol about giving a gift to Mercy Gonzales-Barnes, and she
 was going to get together with Holly and have something to bring tonight, but neither is here so no report
- Were talking about money from benevolence fund, maybe \$250. Thought of it as a love gift to help with personal expenses and to thank her for being here.
- Barbara makes a motion to make a love gift of \$250 to Mercy Gonzales-Barnes on Thursday night at the potluck. Marilyn Benson seconded. Vote. Motion passes.

Hospitality: Sandy Vocolina and Marilyn Benson

 We received another check from the Greene family in gratitude for Kristin's funeral reception. It will be deposited into the General Fund.

Old Rusiness:

Garbage: Holly called the company after our discussion last month and found out that the company was the only one to service this area. Barbara called and set everything up with them.

New Business:

- Received an email from Brotherhood Mutual Insurance Company, asking if they could help
 us in setting up an insurance program with them. Catherine asked Mei Ling what the status
 with Church Mutual was, and Mei Ling said that the new contract renewed in July but it's
 always good to investigate other companies. Other members did point out that there is
 something to be said for loyalty to Church Mutual.
- Dianne raised the important issue of Sunday morning parking. As people have joined us for Sundays, that means we have more cars. There have been some Sundays where there was no parking at all available, and it may be causing people to be turned away. It's a wonderful problem since there are so many people coming, but we've reached a time where we have to think about how we can manage that. The council had a conversation about ideas, and decided that perhaps we need to choose two or three individuals outside of the council that can investigate solutions. Additionally, we can remind the congregation about the possibility of carpooling, and speak to John Rodearmel about a new sign for the overflow lot to ensure that people know they can park there. It was decided that the council members will all think about it in the month ahead and share next month, going forward from there.
- The security camera at the front door for Claudine's and the church offices died. Ron got a price of \$193 to replace it. This price was discounted for the church. The camera can record and you can also add up to 4 cameras into the system for \$45 each. For safety reasons, it was recommended that the camera should be purchased as soon as possible, and decisions about adding other cameras can be discussed at a later date. Ron made a motion to replace the security camera with the new digital system for \$193, and Alex seconded it. The vote was held and the motion passed.
- Generally asked to have our budget for each department ready by December not very far off! Catherine asked the council to consider the following message:
- We've been working reactively a lot this year, dealing with issues not part of our budget that came up unexpectedly. This is inevitable, but Catherine would like us to be more proactive when possible in looking at needs of the church so that we don't get caught short in the middle of the year needing to make so many unanticipated expenditures. Historically, we've operated this way because of tight finances; we've never had a lot of reserve to plan with. But we are in the stewardship season, maybe we could open up thoughts and considerations to the whole congregation. We could ask members what they would like to see in the church, what do you see that needs attention, what would be nice or useful to have (both things and programs). Catherine asks that all on the council to look at their area of concern right now, consider all the things and think ahead a bit better, identifying anything associated with the building and with our program that has to be replaced in a periodic manner, and saying "what is apt to go wrong here?" in planning our 2019 budget. Because of the crunch that we've faced so long, our budget is pretty static one year's budget looks pretty much like the last year's, just increased for fuel, electricity, etc. We might be able to do a little bit better this year with the gifts that we've been given.
- Other side of that is, is there any way we can ask the congregation to get involved? Give out a questionnaire. Maybe we will plan a second hour Sunday session to talk about these. Claudine mentioned that the pastoral evaluation put together by the PRC did ask about church's strengths/challenges, things you'd like to see, etc.. When those are gone over, maybe we could do a second hour where we respond to that and then add more general church things.

Meeting was adjourned at 7:48 p.m.

Next meeting is November 5th at 6:30 p.m.

Claudine's Anniversary Sunday – Sept. 9, 2018 Good morning fellow members, friends, and Pastor Claudine. This morning I wear the hat of your church historian, for this is another special day in our continuing history. Some of you, like me, have been hanging out here for a considerable length of time, but others of you not so long, and might be wondering about the significance of the flowers that grace the pulpit this morning.


A few years ago, September 8, 2002 to be exact, a new preacher rode into town and right into our hearts. On that date she preached her first sermon from this pulpit as the soon-to-be-installed pastor of Poquonnock Bridge Baptist Church.

The following year upon the anniversary of that auspicious occasion a single white rose graced the pulpit by which the members of this faith community expressed not only its love but a renewal of its promise to be her devoted partner in a journey of faith throughout the next year. In each succeeding year on this same day, the bouquet of promise grew by an additional rose. If you are already figuring the size of the bouquet last year you are correct if you said fifteen, and becoming rather awkward for its location.

Today pastor and congregation celebrate sixteen years together as a faith family, and Claudine has earned the distinction of being the longest serving pastor of this church in its 162 year history. Wanting to continue to acknowledge each anniversary in a meaningful way, and feeling that now is an appropriate point at which we change it up a bit your Church Council has planned that beginning today each anniversary Sunday will be marked by three roses, one blossom signifying the remarkable year just completed, including the joys and the sorrows, the difficult hurdles and the pieces of cake, another noting all the years since 2002 that are now part of our history together, and finally the third representing the hopes, aspirations, and challenges that are all part of the anticipation of sharing the year ahead.


