

PBBC Council Minutes June 3, 2019

Our moderator, Catherine Hiller, called the meeting to order at 6:36 p.m. and Barbara Brant led us in devotions.

Before getting into the agenda, Pastor Claudine asked for special prayers for Charley and Portia Freeman and their family, as their grandson Sam had been taken to the hospital after a number of seizures.

All present agreed to dispense with the reading of the June minutes <u>Communications</u>: Barbara received another call from Brotherhood Mutual Insurance, and they would like to know if they can make an appointment to come see the church and give us a quote. We had decided last year not to pursue a contract with them, but Pat will follow up.

All present agreed to dispense with the reading of the June minutes.

Communications:

Catherine brought greetings to the council and the whole church from former pastor Warren Molton and his wife Dianne. Catherine received a call from them earlier in the afternoon saying that they had a family event they were getting ready to attend and were hoping to get a recipe for Poquonnock Bridge Baked Beans. They had a lovely conversation and send their greetings to the church.

Pastor's Report

- Claudine began with a reminder that, as was listed in the bulletin this past Sunday, the Winthrop Baptist Church is celebrating its 275th anniversary on Sunday, July 14th with a 2:00 p.m. worship service followed by a picnic. We would love to have a strong group attend in support, and the church is requesting that those planning to attend RSVP. A reminder will run in the bulletin next Sunday as well.
- On Saturday, July 27th, Claudine will be officiating at a memorial service for Chris Lamb, son of Vance and Shirley Lamb, who passed away last winter. The service will be at PBBC and the reception will be at the Elks Club. Claudine requested ongoing thoughts and prayers for this bittersweet occasion. Vance and Shirley will be arriving soon and will stay for a few weeks.
- Claudine presented a request for an additional week of vacation this year. She reviewed her typical vacation time, which is 4 weeks of vacation a year and a 5th week of "flex time" to be used for continuing education or for vacation. She requested that she receive an extra week of vacation to make it possible for her to take a 2-week trip in October-November to visit her daughter Noelle while she studies abroad in London. She is willing to pay the extra pulpit supply herself if needed, and she has reached out to ensure that Tim Chesser is available to preach. The item was added to New Business.

- The new altar set that we ordered arrived, and Barbara brought it to show to the council. There was an issue with the cross, as it was delivered damaged and also did not appear to be of the quality or aesthetic value that the committee had expected. Barbara has been in contact with the manager of the store we ordered it from and he will be replacing it with one that is hopefully closer to what we have now.
- The search for a new organist and choir director has become much more difficult
 than the committee had anticipated. They have reached out to many music contacts in the area without much result in terms of candidates. The committee requests that all council members reach out to anyone they can think of who might
 be of assistance.

Buildings & Grounds: Alex Lew and Brian Berry (absent)

- The work day was very successful; we had lots of volunteers and a number of tasks were accomplished. The committee wanted to thank everyone who worked so hard, and to provide special thanks to Joe Greene for his many trips to the hardware store! Thank you to Bob Land as well for painting the frame around the stained glass window!
- A number of things still need to be done going forward, and Alex has put together a list of them that Barbara is working on disseminating. These tasks include repairing the parsonage's chain link fence and clearing weeds and poison ivy around the parsonage.
- It was noted that Richard was in attendance to discuss further the issue of the garage in the interest of revisiting the decision we made in June. It was stated that we would move ahead with this discussion in Old Business.

- A special thanks was mentioned to Carol, who diligently provides thorough reports in her absence every month!
- 37 bags of food were collected for June's Second Sunday Food Collection. Specifically requested food items at the moment are jellies, mac and cheese, spaghetti, cereal, pop tarts, diapers, and kitty litter.
- The One Great Hour of Sharing offering is underway!
- It was decided that PBBC would not march in the Independence Day parade this year. We will try to pull together a group again next year.
- Holly recently heard from Courtney about the ministry of the youth group, and while she is struggling in many ways with attendance, she remains optimistic and has a number of fun plans for the upcoming months.

Old Buisness

Garage: Richard said that when he read last month's minutes and saw the details of the contract for Steve Champ's company to demolish the garage, it bothered him because he believes that we have people within the church who would be willing to help tear down the garage without us having to spend that much money. Richard said that he would be willing to take the lead on this project in rounding up volunteers (3-4 workers should suffice) and coordinating the demolition. He estimates that the cost would be more like \$600 to cover the dumpster to remove the material. Discussion was held on this topic, and a number of people had questions about the process answered. Alex moved to rescind the June meeting's motion to award the contract to Steve Champ. Sue seconded the motion. A vote was held and the motion passed. Holly then moved that we accept Richard Tourjee's offer to organize a team for demolition of the present garage. Mei Ling seconded. A vote was held and the motion passed. Richard will move ahead with organizing this project, hopefully scheduling a work day for demolition in mid-August. Mei Ling also suggested that council members think on what we want to do in terms of replacing the garage or not doing so, reminding everyone that we have a surplus of funds right now.

- Sue requested that, at one of our next meetings, we go over the rental lease as a council to see if there are places where we need to firm up language.

 congregation to help with the lawn mowing, and we haven't received any responses.
 Dianne noted that some people have said they would be happy to do it if the church
 owned its own lawnmower. Barbara will put a request in the Tie and in the bulletin
 asking if anyone has a lawnmower to donate.
- Dianne also stated that she has received a request that church members hold off on donating for the Tag Sale until October.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:45 p.m.

Tasks that need to be done

Parsonage:

Must Do:

- Check gutters on parsonage.
- Brush needs to be cleaned up near the parsonage.
- Shrubs on the rear of the parsonage should be inspected, and trimmed as needed.
- Reset the chain link fence.
- There's also a lot of bittersweet and poison oak and ivy which needs to be removed around the fence.
- Rebuild vents in roof ends of the attic of parsonage. The roof of the parsonage could use a good power washing.

Outside of Church:

Must Do:

- Spray the vegetation around the back parking lot's fence. Think it is poison ivy.
- We also need to trim the brush alongside the overflow parking lot, on the side near the road, particularly near the tree at the end of the overflow parking lot furthest away from the entrance.
- Remove hornet's nests on the church itself.
- Siding of the church could also use power washing

Side of foundation near handicapped access ramp needs to be repainted. June 8, 2019 workday got the foundation side near the pastor's parking space, the windows in the church kitchen and around the back.

Church Inside Building:

Must Do:

- Vestry floor needs to be cleaned
- The fellowship hall carpet (as well as the adjacent areas) needs to be shampooed.
- It may also be worth it to shampoo the sanctuary carpet as well at the same time.

Dr. Megan Ranney is Chief Research Officer of AFFIRM Research a non-profit committed to solving the American gun violence epidemic through innovation and evidence. She is also an Associate Professor in the

Department of Emergency Medicine at Rhode Island Hospital/Alpert Medical School of Brown University and Director and Founder of the Brown Emergency Digital Health Innovation program. Dr. Ranney's research focus is on developing,

testing, and disseminating digital health interventions to prevent violence and mental illness; she is Principal Investigator on multiple federally funded grants and has over 100

peer-reviewed publications. In addition to her role at AFFIRM, she serves as Chair of the Rhode Island Governor's Task Force for Gun Safety. She has received numerous awards for violence prevention, technology innovation, public health, and research, and has appeared on media ranging from Fox News to MSNBC to discuss AFFIRM's unique health-focused

. KNOW YOUR CHURCH COUNCIL AND WHAT IT DOES

Building and Grounds Ministry

Serving as deacons on your Church Council and chairpersons of this ministry are Brian Berry and Alex Liu, committee member Ron Land, and others who give of their expertise as the circumstances require. During this season we are especially grateful to Dick Tourjee who keeps the grass at the parsonage under control. Jeff Kent who has been mowing the front lawn of the church has notified us that he is no longer able to do that job and we are seeking a replacement hoping there will be a volunteer from the church membership who can do it at least temporarily until we hire a contractor.

The duties assigned to this team by our church bylaws are primarily those having to do with the upkeep and maintenance of the building and grounds which is a never ending challenge, but In addition, it oversees code compliance, all safety and insurance issues, and determines guidelines for building use by outside groups.

Recently the team was joined by additional workers for the June 8 workday and were able to accomplish the following: repairs and a new coat of paint for the front doors, new LED lights in the Buddington window, and areas of peeling paint on the foundation, the ramp railings, and the vestry vent were scraped and painted. Much vegetation on the church and rental property grounds was trimmed or removed, and the roadside planters were prepared for planting. Most recently, Bob Land completed the transition of the stained glass window in the Fellowship Room by painting the frame of "The Last Supper". The church council extends its thanks to all who have given and continue to give of themselves to help keep our beautiful building in good condition.

Council cont.

There have been inquiries about when the ceiling tiles in the Fellowship Room are going to be replaced. The stained and missing tiles are a result of a serious water leakage situation that plagued us a very long time. We are hoping that the new roofs on the sanctuary and the Miner wing have solved the problem of ice backup in winter storms, and replacing the tiles will be on the work agenda in the near future. If you have any questions about any other areas of the property please don't hesitate to inquire of any member of the Buildings and Grounds Committee is wrestling with the fate of the garage on the rental property. It is in dilapidated condition and the council has concluded that it must be demolished. You may refer to minutes of the July Council meeting for up to date information.
